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Confederate Headstone Dedication Ceremony Set for October 8, 2005

On October 8, at 10:00 a.m., at least ten new Confederate headstones will be dedicated at a ceremony cosponsored by WCHT and Albert Sidney Johnston Camp 67, Sons of Confederate Veterans. (See page 2 for a list of the veterans whose headstones will be dedicated.) The procession to each gravesite will be led by Pipers Lars Sloan and Al Vacek, followed by the Color Guard and Honor Guard of Granbury's Texas Brigade Camp 1479, SCV, which will fire a musket salute in honor of each soldier. Relatives of the veterans and members of SCV and UDC will unveil the headstones and read the soldiers' biographies. Albert Sidney Johnston Camp 67 SCV will host a reception following the ceremony.

DRT and WCHT to Mark Graves of Citizens of the Republic of Texas

Washington Cemetery is the final resting place of perhaps dozens of citizens of the Republic of Texas – persons (regardless of age) who resided in Texas prior to February 19, 1846. For example, we know that at least five of the Confederate veterans buried here were either born in the Republic of Texas or moved to Texas with their parents in the early 1840s. Also buried here are two veterans of the Battle of San Jacinto – Ellis Benson and William Gammell. We hope to discover many more Texians buried here.

The Daughters of the Republic of Texas (DRT) produce an elegant 4½" bronze medallion that can be affixed to an existing headstone to identify a Citizen of the Republic of Texas. **Judy Henderson**, a member of the



Bluebonnet Chapter of DRT in Friendswood, has recently memorialized her great-great-grandparents, **John William Bergin** and **Julia Purcell Bergin**, with a new headstone displaying this medallion.

WCHT and the Bluebonnet Chapter of DRT are now cosponsoring a project to identify, document, and mark the graves of other Citizens of the Republic of Texas buried in Washington Cemetery. We need your help in this, as we have only about a dozen names on the list at present. If you know of anyone buried in Washington Cemetery who may be eligible for this medallion, please contact Judy Henderson or Imogene Macias.

The medallions will be purchased through DRT, as there must be a DRT sponsor for each one. WCHT will cover all expenses of having them installed on the existing headstones.

A formal dedication ceremony is planned for **Saturday**, **March 25**, **2006**. That seems a long way off, but the date was selected so that there would be plenty of time to do the research and order the medallions. We would like to have all medallions on order by **September 15**, **2005** to be sure they will arrive in time for the ceremony.

PLOTS A-5, 6, 11, and 12 FRATERNAL ORDER OF EAGLES

In 1898 at Seattle, Washington, a half dozen theatrical people decided to form a non-sectarian, fraternal organization, the purpose of which was to assist one another in time of need. At first, they called it "The Order of Good Things," but shortly thereafter they named it the "Fraternal Order of Eagles" (F. O. E.).

The Order grew rapidly throughout the United States and Canada. Each local lodge was called an "Aerie" (or Eagles' Nest). The first Houston Aerie (No. 63 in the nation) was chartered on 2 May 1900 by fifty well-known Houstonians. By 1930, membership exceeded 2500 out of a Houston population of 290,000.

Today there are 1700 Aeries in the United States and Canada. There is a very active Women's Auxiliary. Major programs of financial support are heart, cancer, diabetes and Alzheimer's research; aid to retarded children; and mental health institutions.

The first known Eagle to die in Houston was Brother Max Samuels in 1902. He was buried in the Jewish cemetery on San Felipe. On the first of April 1903, the F. O. E. No. 63, in the name of George Ellis, bought four contiguous cemetery plots consisting of 52 burial spaces – Section A, Plots 5, 6, 11, and 12 – for a total of \$600.00. A decorative concrete coping surrounds the four plots. The entrance from the west road is marked with an ornate marble step inscribed with the Eagles' logo, the words "Houston Aerie No. 63, F. O. E.," and the letters "L. T. J. E." (Liberty, Truth, Justice, Equality), the ideals of an Eagle.

The first Eagle to be buried in the plot was Brother **Jesse L. Lankford**, on 19 May 1903. Since then, 47 Eagles have come to rest in this last Aerie.

Treasurer's Report (June 1, 2005)

During the five months ended May 31, 2005, WCHT received 71 donations from individuals. WCHT also receives funds from the **Randalls** *Good Neighbor Program* (WCHT #2810) and **Kroger** *Share* Card.

While WCHT is currently receiving funds through the matching gift programs of ExxonMobil and J. P. Morgan Chase Foundation, many other corporations have matching gift programs for employees and retirees. All of these programs serve as great ways to help finance WCHT's restoration projects.

The total assets of WCHT amount to \$180,311, of which \$85,856 is held in the Improvements Fund for

Schmidt coping, Charles Joseph **Halphen** (1872-1949), Victoria **Halphen** (1873-1943).

Section H: Annie Mae Alewine (1893-1928), Martha Zavodsky (1871-1919).

Strangers Rest (Section H): Jose **Gonzales** (died 1947), Manuel **Olivares** (1889-1939), Amelia B. de **Olivares** (1889-1948), two unmarked adult cradles adjacent to Olivares and Gonzales.

In addition, the Glenwood staff has completed leveling, repair, and cleaning of two headstones and a cradle in Phase 9A for a total of \$975. They are:
