# **Project PATHH Reaches End of Road!**

WE DID IT!! Project PATHH is the first paving project in Washington Cemetery since the 1920's. After many years of promises, and a two-week rain delay, all roads were paved on February 20-21. To anyone who remembers what the roads looked like before we began our upgrade project two years ago, the results are stunning. The total cost over several years, including engineering, was about \$60,000. We have about \$10,000 left in the PATHH Funds, which will be set aside for future road maintenance. (A detailed financial report will be provided in the next newsletter, after all bills are paid.)

Our sincere thanks to all who have contributed to this project, whether by cash donation, in-kind services, volunteer help, or prayers. We could not have made this major improvement to a significant historical site in Houston without the major financial assistance provided by The Brown Foundation, Inc., Houston Endowment Inc., and Rockwell Fund, Inc., plus the hundreds of smaller donations from individuals, corporations, and foundations ranging from \$5 to \$2000. A special thank you is also in order to Board members Sam Belinoski, Mike Gruy, and Bill Scott, who did the preliminary design for Phase I and all of the design for Phases II and III; to Maverick Engineering, who did the survey and detailed engineering for Phase I at considerably less than full market price; and to the contractors, Beta Inc. (Phases I and II) and Craig and Heidt, Inc. (Phase III).

Our thanks too, to all of you who have been so patient for so long. Please come out during our **Spring Visitor/Work Days** on **March 25** or **April 22** and see the new roads!

# New Project: Monument Repairs

Through the diligent efforts of **Sam Belinoski, Eddie Moy**, and **Bill Scott**, all but 14 of the 116 toppled monuments have been righted again. Half of these are broken and will require expert restoration; the other half require extensive leveling of the foundation before they can be set upright. With the road project completed, we can now focus on these and many others that need leveling. We have started a new fund for this purpose and ask for your support. Please advise any Board member about particular monuments, cradles, etc. that need work.

### More Burial Spaces Donated to CCWCC

We are pleased to report two recent donations of burial spaces to CCWCC for resale. These spaces, as well as those in Lot A-74, are available for \$600 per adult space and \$300 per infant/child space. All proceeds from the sale of these spaces will be placed in our perpetual care endowment fund.

**Mrs. John C. (Marian) Beale** of San Antonio has donated five spaces in Lot C-128, located five lots north of the second crossroad and halfway between the second and third roads. The lot was originally purchased by her grandfather, **George W. Phillips**, on February 15, 1892.

**Mr. William Dorsett Smith** and his wife of 49 years, **Iona Nelle Smith**, have donated six spaces in Lot I-2, located at the front of Section I (just west of the first road and 14 lots south of the second crossroad). The lot was originally purchased by his father, **Fred Smith**, about August 18, 1931.

#### **Clements'** Corner

#### Lot C-97, East 1/2: William Henry Koenig

John C. Hoyt, a carpenter, was born in Connecticut in 1818. In June 1880, he was living in Mobile, Alabama with his wife Susanna, a native of Alabama, and two daughters and four sons, ages 2 to 27. They soon moved to Houston, where John died on 21 Dec. 1881, before the German Society Cemetery was established. He is believed to be buried in Glenwood Cemetery. Susanna died on 20 Feb. 1896 at age 64, and was buried here. It cost just \$3.00 to open her grave (Mr. Taylor has donated the original receipt to WCHT). Sometime prior to Nov. 1898, her remains were reinterred elsewhere (exact location unknown).

Their older daughter, Fannie Belle Hoyt, born in Mobile in Oct. 1865, married **William Henry Koenig** in Houston on 29 Aug. 1882. He was born in Houston in Jan. 1861, and lived here all his life.



He was a member of the city's first volunteer fire department and the first baseball team organized here. He was also a charter member of Red Oak Camp No. 95, Woodmen of the World. He began his career as a painter with the Houston & Texas Central Railroad in 1879, and retired

from the Southern Pacific (Texas & New Orleans) 52 years later. Henry and Fannie Belle celebrated their golden anniversary just one month before her death on 26 Sep. 1932. He died 31 May 1935, and is buried beside his wife.

Fannie and Henry had seven children, four of whom are buried here. Two young sons, Henry and Randall, have headstones (without dates), but are not in the cemetery record books. It is believed that Henry is the eldest child, who died 28 Apr. 1884 at the age of 2 months, and was reinterred here about 1895. Randall is believed to have been born about Jan. 1894 and buried here 15 June 1895, although there is no city death certificate, and no given name or year in the cemetery records.

Their other children were Clyde (born 26 Feb. 1887), Gladys Bell (17 Oct. 1888 - 24 Nov. 1954), Harry Hoyt (born 14 Mar. 1892), Lula Mae (23 Nov. 1895 - 3 Dec. 1967), and Ira Bert (born 18 Aug. 1898). Gladys Bell and Lula Mae are buried here.

There are also two Hoyt children buried here, believed to be sons of one of Fannie Belle's brothers: Frank, Charles Clifford, Peter, John C. or Thomas J. Hoyt. The cemetery record book shows that Jim Hoyt, age 5, was buried here on 30 Dec. (no year, but must be 1896 or 1897). The city death certificate shows "Infant of Mr. Hoyt, age 6" and date of death as either 30 Dec. 1897 or 2 Jan. 1897. The other youngster, E. C. (or C. C.) Hoyt, age 9, was buried here 10 Nov. 1898, but has no city death certificate. Neither Hoyt boy has a headstone.

The younger Hoyt daughter, Lula Mae Anderson, was a deputy in the office of Civil Clerk O. M. DeClos. Upon her death July 1, 1916 at age 44, the clerk's office was closed for the day in her honor. She is buried in Glenwood, Lot C-114, together with her father (probably), an infant nephew, and Mrs. F. J. Hoyt, probably a sister-in-law, known to Mr. Jordan and Mr. Taylor only as "Aunt Kutzy". A presumed brother, Charles Hoyt, was buried 17 Feb. 1914 in Glenwood's Strangers' Rest.

Of the seven or more children of John and Susanna Hoyt, Thomas J. Hoyt appears to be the youngest and the only one still living in Sep. 1932. At that time, he was living in Beaumont where he ran a dairy. Mr. Taylor recalls that Fannie Belle's older brother, Peter Hoyt, owned a dairy in Houston, on Westheimer near River Oaks, and had a son born about 1908. Peter was not living with his parents at the time of the 1880 census.

Author's note: There is a lot of uncertainty here, for which I apologize. But since only four of the nine people buried here have headstones with dates, only five have complete dates in the record books, and at least two have no death certificates, piecing together even this much of the puzzle has been an exciting challenge.

#### Deutsche Gesellschaft Charter Date

Mr. Taylor has given WCHT a perpetual care deed containing an embossed seal with the *Deutsche Gesellschaft* charter date of 27 March 1875, almost 12 years before the cemetery was established. It was reorganized as Washington Cemetery on 19 July 1918. This date would seem to indicate that the *Deutsche Gesellschaft* was an existing social/service organization that added a cemetery to its good works, rather than a group formed for the purpose of operating a cemetery.

### WANTED: Your Family Histories

No, we're not starting a library. But we do want to encourage you to compile some biographical information on your loved ones buried here for the benefit of future generations. ### **IRS Eases Paperwork (a little)**

The Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1993 requires us to write you a letter acknowledging receipt of any <u>single</u> donation of \$250 or more, not a total of \$250 during the year. We normally save the expense of acknowledgments, however, we are glad to supply them to anyone who wants or needs one. Just check the acknowledgment box on the return form at the bottom of this page. (Please be patient – one volunteer writes all these letters.) If you have requested an acknowledgment and have <u>not</u> received it, please contact **Bernice Mistrot**.

We remind companies and foundations supporting the restoration and preservation of Washington Cemetery to make their donations to WASHINGTON CEMETERY HISTORIC TRUST, a 501(c)(3) organization, rather than CCWCC, INC. Only individuals can deduct donations to CCWCC, which is tax-exempt under IRS section 501(c)(13).

### **Treasurer's Report**

The recent increase in interest rates has enabled us to raise the average return on our investments from about 4.7% last July to 6.2% now. The CCWCC Perpetual Care Fund stands at \$374,000, up \$7,850 since September 30, 1994. Total value of CCWCC as of March 1, 1995, is about \$391,700; total value of WCHT (after road construction payment) is \$10,515.

Donations are up slightly over this time last year, but are still far short of covering all our expenses. We are very grateful to the 144 individuals and corporations who have contributed to either WCHT or CCWCC since October 1. Donations for routine expenses from October 1 to March 1 totaled \$7,888 while expenses during that normally low-cost time totaled \$7,187. Expenses for cutting the grass have been higher than usual due to the exceptionally mild winter and increased emphasis on careful trimming around headstones, cradles, and copings.

Routine expenses for the remainder of this fiscal year are estimated at \$16,000. That's either 400 more \$40 donations or 75% of all interest on the Perpetual Care Fund for this year. We find that many of the Spring donations are from the same people who give in the Fall. This year, we challenge each of our active donors to interest another person in helping us to preserve Washington Cemetery for future generations to enjoy. *Vielen Hände machen schnell ein Ende.* (Many hands make light work.)

# **Computer Input**

**Ruth Daulley** reports that she has completed the initial computer entry of all burials and lot owners in the first book of records . *Thanks, Ruth!* The 3162 entries include 1089 lot owners, 1087 burials in 1887-1900, 846 in 1900-1907, 71 in 1910-1929, and 69 with incomplete dates in the record book. These numbers will probably change during proofreading and researching of those that were not recorded accurately the first time. We are preparing working indexes, but the final index cannot be done until all records have been entered, which will take several years. If you need information on burials before 1908, or can assist with the research or proofreading, please call Ruth.

# Centennial Book Out of Print

We have sold the last of the Washington Cemetery Centennial Books, published by CCWCC in 1988. It contains the history of the Germans in Houston, the German Society Cemetery, and CCWCC; a list of veterans, biographies of over 850 of the approximately 7000 persons buried here; and maps showing the location of every family plot. There are two surname indexes: eight pages for the maps and ten pages for the rest of the book.
