More Monument Repairs Completed

The Monument Company and Natural Stone, Inc. have completed the repair and cleaning of 42 more old headstones for \$13,335, or an average of \$318 each. Newly restored headstones in Section A are: James G. Funston (1815-1897), Margie F. Funston (died 1907), Willie G. Robinson (1873-1899), Mary C. Groves Baughmann (1848-1895), Maude Baughmann Bowles (1875-1901), Maude Bowles (1901-1902).

We're making real progress, but there are many more to go. Many of the problems with these headstones appear to result from the way they were installed originally. Very few had pins or adhesive between the monument and the base and many had either inadequate or nonexistent foundations. The next group of 110, which will cost about \$35,000, are mostly upright at present, but vulnerable to vandals until stabilized. After that, we'll work on several dozen that have been broken or toppled for a long time, and finally the many that are secure and intact but leaning and unsightly.

During the past 12 months, we have received \$7,615 in donations for the Monument Repair project, including \$4,560 from **Cameron Foundation**, **Exxon**, and **Tenneco**. Thanks for your help -- we couldn't do it without you. We hope you'll visit the cemetery soon to see the results of your donations.

Strangers' Rest Marking Project

The drought this Spring made the ground too hard to dig, but in recent weeks the pace of discovery has picked. up. We have uncovered about 50 markers this year, and expect to have them set in concrete this month. The metal nameplates installed last year are holding up well; however, we need to do a lot more research of names and dates to order more.

The total cost of setting a marker in concrete and making the nameplate is about \$30 each. If you have a loved one buried in one of these unmarked graves, please help us both with the cost and with obtaining the full name and dates for the nameplate. Clements' Corner

Lot B-54: Mrs. Albertine Stuer/Mrs. Lena Detering

Submitted by Julie (Williams) Itz of Houston, great-great-granddaughter of Mathias and Albertine Stuer.

Mathias **Stuer/Stier** was born in Wellingholzhausen, in northwestern Germany, about 1816. According to his youngest daughter, he immigrated to Texas with a brother and invested in cattle and land. Family members recall that he ran the commissary during the War Between the States.

He married Charlotte **Dülberg** on 25 June 1850 in Harris County. Their children, baptized at St. Vincent's Catholic Church in Houston, include Catharine (1851-?), Steven (?), Henry Roger (1856-1887), and Catharina (1857-?).

On 2 March 1861, John M(athias) **Stiere** married Albertine Ernestine **Polzin** in Houston. She is believed to have arrived in Galveston on the *Iris*, on 19 January 1861. Mathias and Albertine lived in the Eureka area (north of the intersection of Hempstead Road and I-10), then *waaay* out in the country. Their children include: Alvina (1862-1936), Catharine Loina (1863-?), Catharine Elizabeth (1865-?), twins Annie (1868-1938) and Emma (1868-?), Clara Emma (1872-1889), and Helena (1874-1958).

Alvina married August Neuen and had four children: Emma (1881-1964, married William Albert Beinhorn), Mamie (1884-1888), Lenora (1891-1971, married Jerry Christian Bauer), and August Ernst Wilhelm (1901-1919). The Beinhorns and Bauers lived in the Spring Branch area, where Beinhorn Road and Neuen Street were named for these families. Several family members are buried in the cemetery at St. Peter's Church on Long Point Road. Annie married William Vollmer and had one daughter, Katie Albertine Wilhelmine (1889-?). They were members of St. John's Church on Mangum Road. Helena married Herman Eberhard Detering and joined the First Evangelical Lutheran Church.

Four members of the Stuer family are buried in Washington Cemetery under a beautiful live oak tree: Mathias (ca. 1816-1892), wife Albertine (1843-1911), son Henry Roger, and daughter Clara Emma.

Deutsche Gesellschaft (German Society)

A few tidbits extracted from continuing research by M. G. Williams, Carl Young, and Bill Waters.

- The 38 members of the *Deutsche Gesellschaft* in 1894 were a diverse lot: 5 saloonkeepers, 5 grocers, 2 restaurateurs, 3 carpenters, 3 carpenter-builders, 2 laborers; also one each attorney, barber, blacksmith, butcher, druggist, gardener, metalsmith, notary public, saddler, shoemaker, tax assessor, hardware store owner, hotel owner, lumberyard owner, beer wagon driver, shipping clerk, and violin maker.
- The following were members or employees of the Society in the early 1900's (these are in addition to the list in the August 1996 newsletter): G. L. Charlton, James Charlton, W. S. Hoskins, Gus Minster, Julia Proetzel, Elsa Schmidt, Emily Schneider, Otto Sens, A. E. Sternenberg, Max Taub, Carl Winkler. New Area Code 281 in Houston Suburbs

Beginning Nov. 2, 1996, Houston will have two area codes -- 713 and 281. Most phones inside Beltway 8 will retain 713, and most outside Beltway 8 (even if within the Houston city limits) will change to 281. Calls between the 713 and 281 areas will continue to be toll-free, but as of May 2, 1997, you must dial the area code to call from one area code to the other. Several of the CCWCC volunteers will be in the 281 area. Please check the number you are calling to be sure you have the right area code.

Membership Roster Update Results

The good news is that, as of November 1, we have received 340 update forms; the bad news is that there are about 860 of them still sitting on desks waiting for you to find a quiet moment to fill them out and mail them back. Please, *please*, try to find such a moment, and save our volunteers from having to make 860 phone calls! Thanks, y'all!

Many active members have not yet returned the form, while several formerly inactive members have become quite interested, so we can't just use past contact as a criterion for determining whether to keep a name on the mailing list. Of course, it would be wonderful if you can send a donation, but if you can't, please don't let that keep you from letting us know whether you're interested in the long-term preservation of Washington Cemetery.

A few statistics from the update forms received so far: 29 were deceased, infirm, or uninterested, and will be removed from the list; 24 requested information from our records; which we will provide over the next couple of months as time permits; 16 volunteered to work on gravesite restoration, 10 on historical research, 7 on contracts and accounting, 4 on computer data entry, and 10 on clerical tasks.

We are encouraged to see that almost 200 of you hope to make annual donations to help maintain Washington Cemetery. Those donations will supply 25-30% of our operating budget; the rest will have to come from additional donations or interest on our endowment fund. We must then request additional donations for any improvement projects such as Monument Repair, Strangers' Rest marking, or historical research. Please help as much as you can.
