#### FUNDS REINVESTED

Our two Certificates of Deposit for perpetual care, totalling \$150,000, matured in Feb. of this year.

Since interest rates have fallen below the minimum 10% interest anticipated to build a perpetual care fund in five years (1990), it was the responsibility of the Board of Directors to investigate and come up with the safest possible way to invest a portion of the funds that would give us a better return on our money.

After much searching and decision-making, the funds were invested as follows:

\$100,000 CD, 9.35% interest, maturity 3-3-87

16,500 American Investors Income Fund, Inc.

16,500 Fidelity High Income Fund 16,500 IDS Extra Income Fund, Inc. 16,500 IDS Federal Income Fund, Inc.

It was decided to restrict any investments other than CD's to funds that represent interest earned and only in diversified type investments.

#### BACK FENCE COMPLETED

The fence across the property line at the back of the cemetery near Allen Parkway has been completed. The approximately two acres between our fence and Allen Parkway is owned by the City Parks Dept. which could become a park in the future.

Clearing the growth, surveying the land and erecting the fence was a tremendous undertaking and we all owe a "thanks" to the few volunteers who accomplished the task.

In order to meet at six month intervals, future meetings will be held in March and September. Newsletters are usually mailed out a month after the meetings which means they will go out in April and October.

#### SPONSOR A TREE

One of our members recently suggested a way to replace the trees we lost during the past year. Those of us who have heard it think it is a good plan. What do you think?

The idea is for anyone desiring to do so to donate the cost of a live oak plus cost of planting in memory of a loved one buried in Washington Cemetery. All the details have not been fully explored as of this time but since no communication is planned until October, we feel we must have funds for trees collected and ready to go when the time is right for planting.

Gene Burks who handled cutting the 34 trees recently, is a horticulturist and has quoted us the following wholesale prices of trees and cost of planting:

A Live Oak (5 gal.) 3 to 6 ft. tall including cost of planting \$20

A Live Oak (20 gal.) 6 to 10 ft. tall including cost of planting \$40

We would like to replace the trees along the front entrance lane with larger trees. Either size could be planted in other areas.

We contacted the City Recreation Dept. about giving us trees under their Releaf Houston Program but they turned us down.

If you wish to donate a tree (or contribute to a fund for trees) please send your donation and indicate on the form at the bottom of this newsletter. Also, if you would be willing to serve on the Tree Committee, let us know (682-3375).

Next year, 1987, Washington Cemetery will be one hundred years old. The Deutsche Gesellschaft which became The German Cemetery and then Washington Cemetery was founded in 1887. The earliest burials after the founding occurred on March 20, 1887, when a J. Turner and Annie Fraser, a child of 22 months, were buried on the same day.
