Since CCWCC's organization in 1975, the two major challenges, as we all know, have been (1) to restore, beautify and maintain WC and (2) to accumulate a fund sufficient to perpetuate care after we, who now accept the challenges, are no longer around.

It is true, our perpetual care fund continues to slowly and steadily grow but that is the easier challenge. The other-to beautify and maintain the cemetery is more difficult and frustrating.

Hopefully, by the time you read this newsletter, the situation will have improved but as of now, none of us can be proud of the way WC looks. However, we hasten to assure you the situation is temporary and conditions will improve.

Our maintenance contractor has encountered more problems than usual this spring. Saturdays are his work days when a crew is available to him. If it rains Sat., cutting is postponed until the following Sat. If it pours during the week, water stands in low places and his mowers bog down until the cemetery dries enough to permit mowing. In the meantime, we watch the grass and weeds shoot up higher and uglier everyday.

Another source of frustration is road washout. One year ago our April '89 newsletter told you that 26 tons of donated crushed stone had been spread on the roads. WHERE DID IT ALL WASH AWAY TO IN ONE YEAR'S TIME?
